## **Policy**

lack of comprehensive urban health policy

Poor use of evidence in policy decisions

Multiple sectors but policy silos

### System

complex systems –
plurality of
providers and
multiple systems

Weak governance and leadership, low capacity

Lack of systemwide approach/thinking

### Organisation

Lack/poor use of SoPs, guidelines and frameworks

Limited capacity – HR, infrastructure and technology

Weak team motivation

Lack of organization business plan

### People

Diverse health needs, limited access to care and disparity in health outcomes

urban poor are masked so their health needs

High risk factors NCDs, infectious diseases

Intersection of urban poor and with social stratifiers creates multiple vulnerabilities

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CONTEXT: poverty, inequality, migration, unplanned urbanization, weak coordination among stakeholders, lack of WASH services and unemployment among others magnified amongst the urban poor

Complex Urban Health Systems – a reality that needs solutions

## **Our focus**

- Strengthening public health capacity of municipal health system
- Promoting use of evidence in decision making
- Identification of urban poor and other vulnerable populations living in listed and unlisted slums
- Community engagement to identify their health needs and locally tailored solutions
- Engaging private health care providers through public private partnership initiatives

# Lessons: action and supporting research, information and policy

- Evidence: little knowns, many unknowns but building on available (knowns) at local level while aiming to know unknowns
- Methods: urban complexities challenges co-creation, building on existing foundation lead to innovation to complex solutions
- Embeddedness: requires investment (time and efforts) in building relationship and trust, lead to acceptance, ownership and long-term goal
- Change process: its often politically driven but we largely focus only technical solutions, this can derail the change process – learn to be politically correct while taking technical approach forward.

# Gains from joining, expanding or linking communities of practice

- Gains are high when lessons are shared timely but sharing lessons is not always straight forward
- Need to create appropriate networks and platforms national, subnational and international level
- Need more focus on implementation research on urban health issues – know who is doing what and how
- Short span of research projects help but fail to gain a comprehensive and long term solutions – more resources is needed
- Research uptake is always crucial, needs more capacity among researchers on how to engage to uptake research to policy and scale
